

Our 2024 Study Tour will be an escorted tour to Northern Italy from April 23 to April 29, 2024. We will be headquartered in Bologna known as the Fat City for its rich cuisine! We will stay in Bologna at the 4-star Royal Hotel Carlton in the center of Bologna, near the train station.

There will be day trips to Forli where Peter Trippi will offer us a guided tour of the exhibit he co-curated (Pre-Raphaelites: A Modern Renaissance). There will also be a day trip to Ravenna (a World Heritage site known as the capital of mosaics), and other places of interest as shown on the itinerary. 

The Alumni Association is very saddened to report on the passing of **Ian Berke** (Newport 1997). He and Margaret were long-time members of the Alumni Association and one of our most faithful travelers. He frequently hosted recruitment events in his beautifully and authentically restored landmark home, circa 1886, which was full of 19th century furniture, silver plate, glass, ceramics, lighting, folk art, and statuary.

San Francisco lost one of its most unique and generous residents on February 18, 2024 when Ian

Berke died at the home he loved at the age of 83, following a cerebral vascular event the day before. Ian would be a "Renaissance" man for the scope of his interests and accomplishments, but for the fact that he so favored American Victoriana. His Born in New York City, the son of Solomon and Estelle Berke, Ian grew up in Dayton, Ohio, where a chemistry prize at the state's Science Fair for detecting uranium in minerals led him to the Colorado School of Mines and a degree in Geological Engineering. Immediately upon graduation, he joined the Army, serving in Vietnam as a First Lieutenant in the 46th Engineering Battalion. He remained there as a civil engineer for five years when his service was complete. Ian then joined Bechtel and moved to San Francisco in 1971, but became a real estate broker two years later, specializing in architecturally significant homes, a career he enjoyed for the rest of his life.

His interests were deep, as well as wide-ranging, fulfilled by a passion for collecting venomous snakes for the Ross Allen Reptile Institute, shells from scuba dives all over the world, minerals and antiques. He was a founding member of the American Decorative Arts Forum and the Real Estate Roundtable and served on the boards of the

Northern California Chapter of Architectural Historians and the Pacific Heights Residents Association, where he exercised his unrelenting support for historic preservation.

He dearly loved serious films and documentaries. For the last decade of his life, Ian devotedly saw one or more films a week, writing online reviews for 500 faithful followers, always exhorting them "to see this one on the big screen."


His intellectual curiosity and wit will be missed by scores of colleagues and friends, but most of all by his wife of 39 years, Margaret Ann Berke, the love of his life; and his sister, Elizabeth Berke-Dreyfuss of Moraga, Calif.; and brother, Michael Berke of Rochester, N.Y. REPORT of the ALUMNI ASSOCIATION of the Victorian Society Summer Schools for the VSA Annual Board Meeting in March 2024

2023 207 members

2022: 217 members

2021: 185 Households + 49 = 234 Total memberships

2020: 206 Households + 50 = 266 Total membership

2019: 177 Households + 57 = 234 Total membership

2018: 147 Households + 53 = 200 Total membership

The Alumni trip to Lisbon which was originally scheduled for 2019 and postpone several times because of Covid was finally completed in March 2023. The trip raised \$12,000 in donations to the scholarship fund and there was an additional profit with the totals to be finalized before the end of the year. The Pittsburgh account is the checking account used to deposit traveler payments and pay trip bills. The account details concerning income, disbursements, and balance is reported and included in the annual alumni financial report submitted to the VSA.

With John Martine's retirement as Alumni Study Tour Director, he will have the final accounting for the 2023 trip completed by the end of the year at which time he expects to transfer the balance in the account to the Alumni Treasurer. The Alumni trip to Northern Italy from April 23 to April 29, 2024 will include day trips to Ravenna with the headquarters hotel located in Bologna and a day trip to Forli, IT with a guided tour of Peter Trippi's exhibit. 14 people have signed up so far.

The 12/31/2023 Alumni Financial report was submitted to VSA as required. As of 12/31/2023 the Endowment Fund had a balance of \$222,747. The Checking Account as of 12/31/2023 had a balance of \$45,188. The Pittsburgh Account had \$55,740. This account was subsequently closed and the balance transferred to the main Alumni checking account.

The Alumni Endowment Fund Finance Committee consisting of Sibyl Groff, Bob Chapman, David Lamdin, Jme Russiello, and Jim Buttrick, met several times with the Financial Advisor, eCIO, to discuss the performance of our Endowment Fund and the performance of our Financial Advisors to determine a path forward with recommendations for the Alumni Board on any actions necessary. The Committee recommended that the Board retain eCIO as our financial advisor, that the Board amend our Investment Policy Statement (IPS) to put our Endowment Fund in a better position to accommodate the change in the stock market environment since the last IPS was adopted by the Board, and to take a \$2,500 distribution from the Fund for 2024 scholarships. The Board adopted all of these recommendations with deep appreciation to the Committee or doing its due diligence in monitoring the performance of the Endowment Fund.

The Alumni Association paid our \$100 Chapter Dues and contributed \$250 for a Zoom presentation for a Chicago recruitment event in January 2023.

We contributed \$24,000 for Student Scholarships to the 2023 Summer Schools.

We continued our sponsorship of receptions for the 2023 Summer Schools students and friends. We contributed \$500 for receptions in Chicago and \$500 for a reception in London. Pauline Metcalf graciously sponsored a reception for the Newport students at her summer home on behalf of the Alumni Association. In the Alumni Board's approved budget for 2024 funds for making grants for 2024 summer school receptions was included. Pauline Metcalf will again pay for the reception at her beautiful Rhode Island home.

We joined with VSA national and responded to the call of the VSA NYC Chapter for assistance by donating \$100 for a live, in-person program presenting author Michael Kathrens' lecture on the luxury and splendor of Newport's nineteenth-century summer "cottages," in his most recent book, *Newport Cottages 1835-1890: The Summer Villas Before the Vanderbilt Era*.

We have been in contact with John Cooper, our alumni webmaster, to update our Membership Form on the website. The Alumni Board carefully considered having the alumni website hosted on the VSA website. For a variety of reasons, the Board decided that the Alumni should maintain its own website. We so advised the VSA and we are in contact now with a potential new webmaster to update and maintain our website.

We published eleven eNewsletters in 2023. These well received digital newsletters continue to provide an effective and inexpensive means of informing our members of items of interest to the Alumni. We published a special newsletter on February 29, 2024 to inform about 500 folks on our mailing list of the extension of time to apply for a summer school until March 15, 2024.

Many members of the Alumni Association participated in, supported, and thoroughly enjoyed the excellent video lectures presented by the VSA in 2023.

We continue to experience many issues with our Wells Fargo bank. The most recent issue is that WF will not accept any checks that are not made payable specifically to Victorian Society in America, Inc. I had a check that did not include Inc, and with no other customers there, it took three employees and a phone call and over 20 minutes before they finally decide that they would accept the check for deposit. The Alumni Board decided that we should invest some of our funds which are now in a non-interest-bearing checking account into a CD. I now have some 30 pages of forms for Jackie to fill-out before we can open a CD.

At the 2021 Annual Meeting, a new Board of Directors was elected for the period 2022 through 2024. We will need to have new elections at the 2024 annual meeting. Anyone interested in serving on the Alumni Board or in helping with our administrative tasks should contact the Alumni President.

The Alumni Association expresses its deep appreciation to Sara Durkacs who resigned a Membership Secretary due to the pressing needs of her job. Sara's efforts over the past several years has been crucial to our success and survival. We wish Sara all good fortune in the years ahead. As Membership Secretary, Emeritus, Sara is helping in the training of Travis Brock Kennedy as the new Alumni Membership Secretary. However, because of increased work responsibilities, Travis has not been able to take over Sara's Membership Secretary duties as hoped. James Russiello is meeting with Sara to discuss the duties of Membership Secretary. Unfortunately, this comes at the worst possible time as this is membership renewal season. We notified our membership of the situation and advised them that there would be some delay in issuing acknowledgement letters. We may consider adding a line on the membership form to let people opt out of receiving an acknowledgement letter since so many take the standard deductions now.

The Alumni Board approved a 2024 Budget which included up to \$25,000 for scholarships for 2024 students.

The Alumni Board approved, and the Chapter submitted on time, all of the annual reports as required by the VSA.

Last but far from least, our enduring and deep gratitude to John Martine who successfully led the Alumni Study Tour Program. After over 30 years of extraordinary effort and service to the Alumni Association as the volunteer director of the Alumni Study Tour Program probably raising approximately a quarter of a million dollars to fund Alumni Scholarships, John Martine (London 1979 and 2013, Newport 2007, and Chicago 2016 and 2019) has decided to step back from that role but will continue to serve the Alumni as the Study Tour Director, Emeritus, providing the Alumni with his expert advice and assistance on future trips. The Alumni Association has solicited interest about this position and has received several notices of interest. We will address this issue as soon as the planning for the Italy trip is concluded.

It has been a very active and exhausting few months for the Alumni Association. We very much appreciate the efforts of its officers and directors whose active participation enable the Alumni Association to be an entirely volunteer organization except for the webmaster. We also deeply appreciate the support of Sue, John, and Cindy at the VSA for their support and guidance in helping us navigate and stay afloat these past few months.
